Career

Before coming to Hamburg in 2009 she taught at the Free University of Berlin, Stanford, Carleton, Sussex, Hannover, Queen's Belfast and Bath. She currently holds the Chair of Political Science, especially Global Governance at the University of Hamburg. Where she served as Managing Director of the Centre for Globalisation and Governance (CGG) in 2009-10 & 2011-12 and directs Research Area 4 on Global Constitutionalism, Governance and World Society.

In 2017 she was elected as By-Fellow at Hughes Hall, Cambridge (until 2020), and in 2011 she was awarded a Fellowship of the Academy of Social Sciences in the United Kingdom. In addition she held international visiting and research fellowships in the USA (Stanford), Canada (Victoria; Carleton; Toronto), the UK (Sussex; Nuffield, Oxford; Institute for Advanced Studies, Edinburgh; Lauterpacht and Hughes, Cambridge), Italy (EUI), Germany (Institute for Advanced Studies-HWK Delmenhorst; Social Science Research Centre-WZB Berlin) and the Netherlands (Institute for Advanced Studies-NIAS). Boards

She is a founding editor of the interdisciplinary journal Global Constitutionalism: Human Rights, Democracy, Rule of Law which has been published with Cambridge University Press since 2012, and served as editor of the European Political Science Review, the German Political Science Journal (PVS), and on editorial boards for the German Journal of International Relations (ZIB), the Journal of European Public Policy and the International Studies Review. She was a member of the Lionel Gelber Prize jury 2017 and chaired the Chadwick Alger Award jury of the International Studies Association in 2016-17. Her international involvement in learned societies, boards and executive committees includes serving on the Executive Committees of the Standing Group of International Relations (SGIR) of the European Consortium for Political Research (ECPR), the International Studies Association and the German Political Science Association. From 2016 to 2018 she has been appointed to the Peer Review Group of the ESRC's Global Challenges Research Fund.
