Forced Migration into Insecurity: Drivers, Corridors, Consequences

The lecture will apply the conflict cycle as an analytical lens to human mobility. It will look at forced migration 1) as migration out of violence, 2) as migration into violence, and 3) as a violent process in and of itself. With a particular focus on the consequences of the Syrian war, it will outline the various drivers of forced migration, the available physical, legal and political corridors for forced migrants, as well as the lived experience of people fleeing from violence.

Christiane Fröhlich is Mercator-IPC-Fellow at the Istanbul Policy Center of Sabanci University and Research Fellow at the Institute for Peace Research and Security Policy at Hamburg University. Her research focuses on environmental migration in the Middle East as well as the intersection between human mobility and conflict more generally. In the past, she has worked extensively on water conflicts on the international, national and local levels, as well as on the Israeli-Palestinian core conflict and its role for Middle Eastern geopolitics. She holds a PhD from the Center for Conflict Studies at Marburg University, and a Master in Peace Research and Security Policy from Hamburg University.
