Moin to Hamburg, Germany!

Recognized as Germany's gateway to the world and a city where maritime heritage meets modern innovation, we are excited to welcome you to this year's workshop in Hamburg. The city is one of the most beautiful and wealthiest cities in Germany with large companies and numerous educational institutions. However, its wealth was built in large part on colonial trade, particularly through the processing and distribution of goods from European colonies. Profits from sugar, coffee, tobacco, and the transatlantic slave trade helped fund the merchant houses and trading companies that defined the city's identity. Today, Hamburg has begun to confront this complex past more openly, with museums, public art, and academic initiatives addressing the city's role in colonial exploitation.

As you explore Hamburg during your visit, you'll discover a city that embodies both the opportunities and contradictions of global capitalism, with its very rich areas of "old money" and autonomous leftist projects deeply rooted in the city. Amid Hamburg's contrasts, this workshop finds a space for critical thought, reflection, and exchange.

For leisure time, Hamburg offers a wide range of experiences that reflect its cosmopolitan character. Stroll along the Elbe River promenade for stunning harbor views, or explore the trendy Schanzenviertel with its alternative culture and vibrant café scene.

Art enthusiasts can visit the impressive Kunsthalle or the iconic Elbphilharmonie concert hall, whose wave-like architecture has become a modern symbol of the city. Hamburg's many canals — earning it the nickname "Venice of the North" — invite you to discover the city from the water on a boat tour that reveals its maritime soul from a unique perspective.

In the heart of the city, the historic *Planten un Blomen* park offers a peaceful green retreat. Those interested in contemporary culture will find a thriving music and club scene, independent cinemas, and numerous small galleries and cultural spaces throughout the city.

The nearby St. Pauli district offers everything from avant-garde theaters to traditional Hamburg cuisine. For a lively evening out, Sternschanze is full of popular bars and restaurants. Just around the corner, the Feldstraße Bunker, a former WWII airraid shelter, has become a creative and cultural landmark. Since 2024, its rooftop garden with panoramic city views is open to the public.











Mans & Venue





This year's workshops will take place on the campus of the University of Hamburg, in the East Wing (ESA Ost) of the main university building. Sessions will be held in rooms 123, 221 and 222, located on first and second floor of ESA Ost. The rooms have barrier-free access.

The venue can be easily reached by public transport. Tickets can be purchased online through the DB App or at vending machines inside the train stations. A one-way ticket (Hamburg Hbf -> Hamburg Dammtor) costs €1.95. Please check if local public transport is included in your train ticket ("City-Ticket").

Upon arrival at Hamburg Hauptbahnhof, follow the signs for "S-Bahn" and take either the **S5 towards Elbgaustraße or S2 towards Altona**.

Get off at the next stop: Hamburg Dammtor. Once you arrive at Hamburg Dammtor, simply cross the street toward the university. The workshop venue is located in the right-hand building across the street.





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We have secured a limited number of hotel rooms in advance at the IntercityHotel Hamburg Dammtor-Messe.

The rooms are blocked until July, 16. To reserve your room, write to reservations.hamburg-dammtor@intercityhotel.com using the code **Pluralumn25**. Please indicate whether you want to book a single or double room for one or both nights.



Rates are as follows:

Single room: €111.57 per room/night, including breakfast Double room: €131.57 per room/night, including breakfast

The hotel is approximately a 10-minute walk from the event venue and can be reached barrier-free. From Hamburg Central Station, you can reach the hotel in about 15 minutes by taking the S2 or S5 S-Bahn lines to Hamburg Dammtor.

Please note that you are required to book your travel and accommodation yourself. We kindly ask you to draw on your own institutional funding, if available. Otherwise, we hope to be able to reimburse travel expenses. However, due to high demand, these are limited to activley presenting participants. At this point, we are unable to make any firm commitments regarding the exact amount. Please take this into account when planning your trip. Reimbursements of accomodation are not limited to the InterCity Hotel but require a receipt. Note, that we do not reimburse expenses for flight tickets.
